## TUMBLE POLISHING ROCK

**Everybody is probably tired of hearing about tumbling but I want to attach an outline of steps that I recommend and use myself. Again, this type of Lapidary work is 90 % horse sense. You will develop your own methods and use as you become more familiar. This outline is intended as a starting point to help you form your own routines.**

### Select Material and Load Tumbler

1. Use material of same or nearly same hardness such as Agate, Petrified Wood, Obsidian, etc.
2. Try to select rocks for attractive shapes, colors and etc. even possibly preparing some by grinding and shaping before tumbling.
3. Use graduated sizes, starting with very few large (1 ½ to 3inch) and more of each smaller size so you have a load well sorted by size. You can break up the bigger stones to get smaller sizes.
4. Fill the tumbler barrel, (I am assuming a 12 lb load), 2/3 full. Add about 25% media or small material such as crushed glass.
5. Add 3-4 heaping Tablespoons (Tbsp) (about 1/4<sup>th</sup> cup) of 60-90 Silicon Carbide (SC) grit and water to just cover the load.
6. Bentonite or drilling mud can also be added now. Use 2-3 Tbsp. This is not necessary but forms a carrier to make the grit stick to the rocks and, I think, improves the grinding action.

### Grinding and Shaping

1. Run this first grind 7 days, open the tumbler and wash out and examine rocks. Don't wash down drain the muck turns into cement, I wash out in the grass.. Sort the rocks and discard unattractive junk.. If you are not satisfied with shape and rounded appearance repeat the coarse grind step.
2. When you are satisfied with the shape and appearance of rocks, move on to the fine grinding step using 220 SC grit. Use ½ as much 220 SC as you did the 60-90. Add more media if needed and if you wish add the drill mud again. I do this myself but it not necessary.
3. Cover with water and roll 6-7 days. Open, wash out and examine rocks. At this point the rocks should be very smooth and have well rounded shapes. Sort and discard any junk. If you are satisfied with the rocks, you can move on. If not repeat the fine grinding step (220 grit SC)..

### Vibrator Grinding and Polishing

1. At this time, things become a little dicey and

you have to use your good judgment. I recommend that you now go to the vibrotumbler for finishing.

2. Put your rocks in the vibrotumbler and add media if needed to fill the tumbler 2/3 full. Add 2 level teaspoons 400 Aluminum Oxide (Alox) and a small amount of dish soap. Start the tumbler and add water until the sound smoothes and is not harsh. Water is usually ¼ to 1/3 of load.
3. Run tumbler 1 to 3 days checking the rocks daily. At this point the rocks become very smooth or even shiny and you can move on to the next step.
4. Repeat step 2 using 1 teaspoon of 600 Alox. Run one day and examine the rocks. Now the rocks should very smooth or shiny and you can either move to polish or run another day or two. This is a judgment call.
5. Wash out, and if you want to move on, repeat step 4 using 1 teaspoon of TXP aluminum oxide polish. You can use some other type of polish. In my experience the Alox polish works fine.
6. Your rock should begin to show a good polish after 4-5 hours and one day is usually satisfactory for polishing. Again, use your judgment. You can run longer if you wish.
7. After you are satisfied with your polish; wash out and run the load 4-6 hours with only dish soap and water. This is called a burnishing step.
8. I hope you are satisfied at this point. This essentially the method that Bill Myers and I use.

## Rules to Live By

1. At each step, reduce the amount of grit or polish used by 50%
2. At each step, increase the media proportion. When you get to the polish step, media should be 75% or more of the load.
3. Also, at each step grinding or polishing time is reduced. That is; first step longest, last step shortest.
4. Always use graduated, well sorted rock size ranges.
5. Work with the best rock you can get. **Garbage in Garbage out.**
6. If you don't have a vibrotumbler arrange to use the club machine. This is why we bought it.
7. **Good Luck.!**

Bob Patterson suggested to Gary Hudson that he get together with Carlos Talley, Jim Owens, and Tony Steele to form a committee to look into the matter and report back to the club.

**New Business:**

Tim Walker asked about the vibrator tumblers. Helen Patterson suggested calling one of the dealers who usually attends our shows to see if he could get us some tumblers at a discounted price. Anyone in the club who is interested in buying a vibrator tumbler should get in touch with Gary Hudson. One company he deals with has a list price of \$355. Another company he uses might give a 10% discount. There are several companies that can be contacted for different prices.

Carlos Talley suggested that the club name be changed to include "Abilene" so that people would be aware of our location. Sally Lightfoot pointed out that our logo already includes the word "Abilene" in it. Gary Hudson suggested that we use "Abilene" in our advertising for future shows.

Helen Patterson commented that Bill Gilles had told her that he thought we had one of the best rock and mineral shows in the country because of our displays.

Don Brenholtz said that members were welcome to come out to his property to hunt for rocks. He just asked that people call him first.

This week's guests were welcomed and introduced to the club.

Gary Hudson was complimented for doing a good job on the newsletter.

Bob Patterson brought up a recent article in AFMS. A doctor was collecting staurolites on forest service land. He and his wife had dug about 5" to 6" in the ground, found several staurolites, and restored the ground. A ranger gave them two citations for \$250 each, which were then doubled and somehow ended up costing the doctor \$2000. Apparently there is a law in effect that states that no one is allowed to damage any natural feature on forest service land. There was some discussion on who decided what was a natural formation, and if it could differ from ranger to ranger.
